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Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic

"Balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic" is issued by the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic. This document reflects last tendencies in external sector development and shows statistical data on the balance of payments, external trade, international reserves, external debt and international investment position, as well as construction methods of balance of payments and informational database. This document is published 4 times a year - in January, May, July and October and has 3 language versions: Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

Last updated version was published in January 20, 2009.

- ... means the absence of data;
- means, that indicators/ratios are equal to 0 (zero) or insignificant;
- is set between years or months (e.g., 1994-1996 or January-June) and means, that all years and months are covered by the shown dates.

Deviations in last digits may occur because of rounding numbers when summing up.

In regard with the possible changes in accounting methods or historical data, which are used in the given document, correction of earlier published data is acceptable. Therefore, 10 years period can be accounted as "open period".

Bulletin of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic

Informational publication includes statistical data on the basic macroeconomic indicators and economy sectors of the Kyrgyz Republic. It is published in 3 languages: Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

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This publication describes dynamics of consumer prices in the republic and regions, analysis of the main inflation factors, informs about the National Bank decisions on monetary policy and provides with inflation preview for the oncoming period. It is published quarterly in Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

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The given document provides analysis of the banking system status of the Kyrgyz Republic as a financial intermediary, as well as the banking system stability by segment. It is published twice a year in Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

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The purpose of the document, called "Normative Acts of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic" is to publish normative acts of the National Bank in order to provide commercial banks and public with normative acts of the National Bank and official information on the National Bank activity, as well as propaganda of the Kyrgyz Republic law. Presumable publication frequency is once a month in Kyrgyz and Russian languages.

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"Press-release of the National Bank" describes current events, which take place in National Bank and provides with the major data on the financial market. It is published weekly in Kyrgyz and Russian languages.

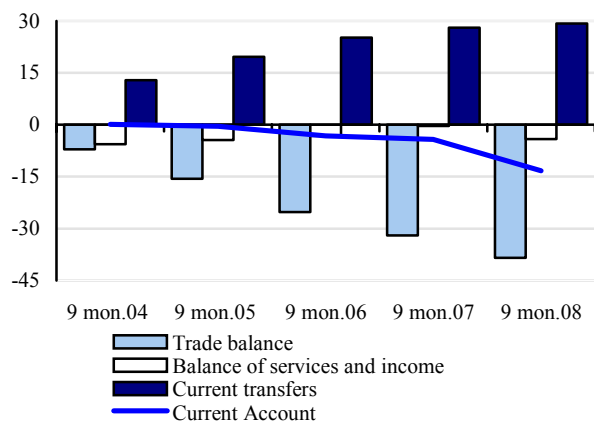

CURRENT BALANCE OF PAYMENTS STATUS

The current account balance turned out to be negative making US\$ 489.6 million or 12.5 percent of GDP.

in percent of GDP

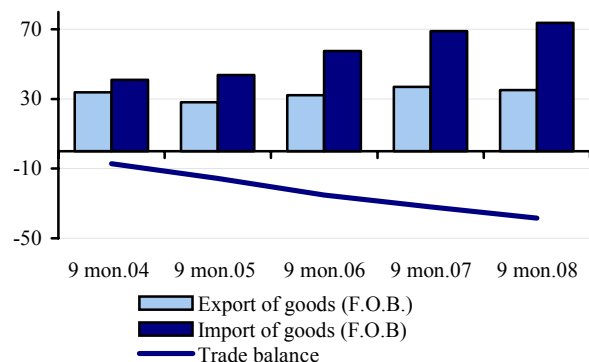


TRADE BALANCE

The volume of external trade¹ of the Kyrgyz Republic increased by 45.3 percent and totaled US\$ 4001.1 million in January to September 2008 as compared with the similar period of 2007.

Based on figures of the period under review, in terms of volume, the trade gap¹ developed at US\$ 1412.6 million, being by 70.0 percent larger than the index for nine months of 2007.

In terms of volume, **export of goods**¹ at FOB prices totaled US\$ 1294.2 million in the reporting period as

compared with US\$ 961.3 million in the similar period of 2007.

Except for investment goods, the functional structure² of export displayed growth in January to September by all items. The largest functional distribution items of export were those of intermediate goods (39.3 percent in the total of exports), energy resources (27.1 percent) and consumer goods (21.1 percent). Export of intermediate goods in January to September 2008 increased as compared with the base period by 36.8 percent and totaled US\$ 449.5 million. This growth results from increased deliveries of gold and silver, mineral chemicals, cement and Portland cement, nonferrous waste, paper, cardboard, paper stuff products, and rubber tires. Due to growth of re-export of petroleum products in the reporting period, the deliveries of petroleum products increased by 47.3 percent and totaled US\$ 309.8 million. Export of consumer goods increased by 34.6 percent, having thus totaled US\$ 241.5 million in value terms. Growth of export of such significant items, as vegetables and fruits, clothes and clothing accessories, dairy products, gold and silver jewelry, margarine and fat and live animals was observed in this category of goods. The value of investments for January to September 2008 decreased by 40.5 percent as compared with nine months of 2007. In this regard, the share of this group in total export transactions decreased from 5.3 to 2.2 percent. The basic reason for this reduction was that of lack of export of special vehicles earlier imported to our country in the similar period of 2007.

September 2008 made 52.4 and 47.6 percent, correspondingly.

For the period of January to September 2008, significant volumes of goods were exported to such CIS countries, as Russia (the volume of exports totaled US\$ 237.3 million), Uzbekistan (US\$ 174.0 million), Kazakhstan (US\$ 154.3 million). Export of goods to Russia increased by 48.4 percent in the reporting period. The structure of export to this country showed the increase in the deliveries of vegetables and fruits, clothes and clothing accessories, rolled glass, jet fuel (re-export), and cotton. Based on nine month figures, export to Uzbekistan increased 3.1 times, due to, mainly, growth of deliveries of petroleum products. Export to Kazakhstan increased by 2.4 percent. This growth resulted from basically the deliveries of dairy products, margarine and fat, electricity, as well as due to growth of incandescent lamps, cement and Portland cement. Furthermore, the commodity structure of export to this country showed the reduction of deliveries of specific construction materials, clothes and clothing accessories and plastic products for transportation and packing of goods.

Export deliveries to non-CIS countries increased, in particular, to such partner countries, as the UAE (5.4 times, as compared with nine months of 2007), Turkey (by 45.1 percent), Latvia (4.0 times), and Switzerland (by 45.0 percent). Export to the UAE increased due to, mainly, the deliveries of gold, and, in addition to this, jet fuel was re-exported to this country. The basic reason for increased export to Turkey was that of increased deliveries of jet fuel (re-export) and walnuts. Volumes of export deliveries to Latvia increased due to petroleum products, whose share ensured 94.8 percent of export to this country. Export to Switzerland increased due to traditionally the deliveries of gold, whose volumes increased because of growth of prices as well as growth of the volume of deliveries. The reduction was at the same time observed in export to China (by 26.7 percent, as compared with the similar period of 2007) and to Afghanistan (by 62.3 percent). The volume of exports to China decreased because of, principally, the reduction of deliveries of investment goods, wool, sheep and lamb skin, fuel oil, and aluminum. The reduction of export to Afghanistan is explained by

basically the reduction of re-export deliveries of petroleum products.

Import of goods at FOB prices totaled US\$ 2 706.8 million for the period of January to September 2008 as against US\$1 792.3 million in the similar period of 2007.

In the reporting period, growth was registered with regard to all of the items in the functional structure of imports at CIF prices. Import of consumer goods increased 2.6 times through these were, mainly, receipts of medicaments, sugar, coffee, tea, cocoa and cocoa products, particularly, chocolate products, meat and meat products, vegetable oil, various drinks, vegetables and fruits, corn products, clothes and footwear, and vehicles. Import of raw produce increased by 62.1 percent due to growth of the volume of deliveries of cast iron, steel, and grain, whose volumes increased on impact of a rise in import prices, and due to imports of timber. Imports of intermediate goods increased by 37.8 percent. This group of goods showed growth in the reporting period of import deliveries of textiles, inorganic chemicals, essential oils, paper, cardboard and paper stuff products, fertilizers, dye-stuff and tanning agents, and metal scrap and nonferrous waste. The import deliveries of investment goods increased by 18.8 percent conditioned by the deliveries of telephone and telegraph equipment, trucks, special vehicles, and various devices and equipment. The increased prices and volume of petroleum products and coal, as well as the increased prices of natural gas, determined growth of imports of energy products by 78.4 percent.

According to the geographic structure of imports at CIF prices for the period of January to September 2008, the volume of deliveries from non-CIS countries was noted to double, while imports from CIS countries increased by 55.9 percent. However, despite this

significant increase the share of non-CIS countries in the total of imports remained low – 43.5 percent, while the share of CIS countries was 56.5 percent.

Russia, Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan were the basis partners from among CIS countries. The shares of these countries in the total of import transactions of Kyrgyzstan with CIS countries were 69.4, 16.2 and 6.9 percent, accordingly. Russian import increased by 65.5 percent and totaled US\$ 1 135.8 million. The deliveries of such basic goods, as petroleum products, iron and steel, coniferous timber, beer, chocolate products, and vegetable oils increased from this country. Import deliveries from Kazakhstan grew by 33.6 percent and reached the level of US\$ 265.3 million. Kazakh import is characterized by growth of deliveries of grain, flour, soft drinks, motor petrol, coal, non-ferrous scrap and waste, cast iron, steel, and inorganic chemicals. Import from Uzbekistan increased by 37.4 percent in the reporting period and totaled US\$ 113.6 million in terms of value. Import of natural gas increased in the reporting period due to growth of prices. The import deliveries of fertilizers from Uzbekistan increased either.

China (38.0 percent of the volume of imports from non-CIS countries), Germany (17.0 percent), Japan (7.9 percent), and the USA (6.4 percent) were the largest partners in import transactions among non-CIS countries in the period under review. Quality improvement in the statistics of foreign economic transactions in 2008, particularly, a possibility to distribute the trade statistics of individuals by the geographic structure and commodity patterns allowed to fully reflect foreign trade data. Thus, starting from 2008, import of new and second-hand vehicles from Japan and Germany was noted to grow and it is explained by not only growth of the volume of their deliveries, it is due to, first of all, quality improvement in the foreign trade statistics. Import from China doubled for nine months of 2008 as compared with the similar period of 2007. This country increased imports to our country of textiles, machinery and equipment for civil engineering, communication machinery and equipment, trucks, special vehicles, clothes, footwear, and various instruments. The USA imported goods to our country in the reporting period by 21.7 percent more than in nine months of 2007. This growth is due to the increased deliveries of

medicaments, poultry, as well as second hand vehicles.

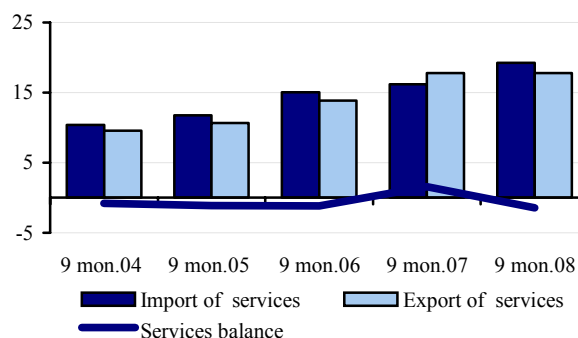
BALANCE OF INTERNATIONAL SERVICES

The balance of international services for nine months of 2008 developed as negative of US\$ 52.7 million as against the positive balance of US\$ 40.7 million for nine months of 2007. In this regard, export of services increased by 41.6 percent, while import grew by 67.8 percent as compared with the similar period of 2007.

Based on 2008 figures, the total volume of services rendered to non-residents was US\$ 653.9 million as against US\$ 461.7 million in the similar period of 2007.

The largest share in total export of services is that of the item “Travels” (48.6 percent), “Transportation Services” (21.1 percent), “Business Services” (10.0 percent), and “Construction Services” (2.8 percent).

The increase in exports in the reporting period is connected with growth of export of services under the item “Travels”, which increased 1.4 times as against the similar period of 2007 and totaled US\$ 317.9 million. Export of services under the item “Transportation Services” increased as well - 1.5 times relative to the similar period of 2007 and totaled US\$ 138.1 million. Export of services under the item “Business Services” displayed 1.1 times growth with regard to the comparable period of 2007 and totaled US\$ 65.6 million. Export of services under the item “Construction Services” grew 1.4 times and totaled US\$ 18.3 million as against the same period of 2007.

The volume of imports of services for nine months of 2008 totaled US\$ 706.6 million. The largest share in

imports of services was that of “Transportation Services” (48.3 percent), “Travels” (28.8 percent), “Business Services” (9.0 percent), and “Construction Services” (5.2 percent).

The increase in imports in the reporting period is connected with growth of imports of services under the following items: “Transportation Services” that showed the increase by 41.1 percent against nine months of 2007 and totaled US\$ 341.1 million in 2008. Significant growth of imports fell also on the item “Travels”, whose growth was 3.2 times against nine months of 2007 and totaled US\$ 203.4 million in 2008. There was also the increase in the item “Business Services”, which increased by 4.6 percent as compared with the similar period of the previous year. As compared with the base period, the significant - 4.3 times - increase was noted in also the item “Construction Services” and totaled US\$ 36.5 million in 2008.

INCOME

Based on the figures of nine months of 2008, the **Balance of Income** developed as negative of US\$ 99.4 million being twice larger than the index of 2007.

Growth of the negative balance in this item is connected with growth of expenditures of residents under the item **Income from Investment**. For instance, as compared with nine months of 2007, the negative balance of the item “Income from Direct Investment” increased by 88.2 percent totaling US\$ 81.1 million. Growth of interest payments on loans from direct investors had the larger impact on this change. The item **“Income from Other Investment”** developed as having the negative balance of US\$ 2.3 million, as against the positive balance of US\$ 8.8 million in the similar period of 2007. The negative balance of this index developed as a result of the increase in the amount of interest paid on foreign loans.

For nine months of 2008, the balance of the item **“Compensation of Employees”** developed as negative of US\$ 16.3 million and as compared with the similar period of 2007 this indicator increased by 6.5 percent.

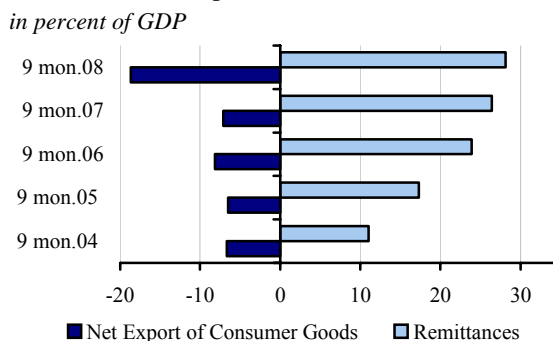
CURRENT TRANSFERS

The balance of **current transfers** for nine months of 2008 developed as positive of US\$ 1 075.1 million, being 1.5 times larger than the base period index. The basic share in the total of current transfers was traditionally that of money transfers of workers, whose net inflow increased by 50.7 percent. According to the NSC, this growth happened despite the fact that for nine months of 2008 the outflow of migrants⁴ from the republic decreased by 36.5 percent. In this regard, this reduction was due to the Osh and Jalalabt regions that were traditionally considered as basic suppliers of labor migrants.

In turn, the largest share in the item “Workers’ Remittances” was that of remittances through money transfer systems⁵ (79.8 percent). The net inflow of remittances through the money transfer systems grew against the comparable period of 2007 by 82.9 percent. In this regard, the geographic distribution of remittances remains stable. For instance, based on the figures of nine months of 2008, the basic share of remittances came from the Russian Federation (92.6 percent), the USA (5.5 percent), and Kazakhstan (1.7 percent). Money from the Kyrgyz Republic was mainly transferred to the Russian Federation (92.0 percent), Kazakhstan (4.7 percent) and the USA (2.3 percent).

It should be noted that the balance of money transfers is larger than net export of consumer goods, which in turn developed with the deficit of US\$ 686.0 million.

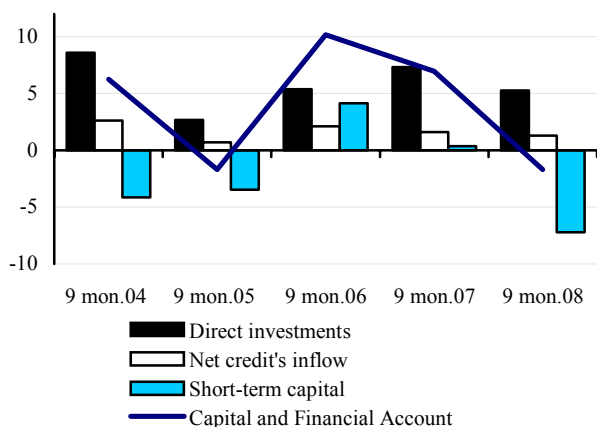
The net inflow of **official transfers** totaled US\$ 18.0 million and it is by 22.3 percent less than the index of the similar period of the last year. This reduction is basically caused by the reduction in the volume of grants received by the public sector.

CAPITAL AND FINANCIAL ACCOUNT

In the reporting period the balance of the **Capital and Financial Account** (in the analytic format of presentation) developed with the negative balance of US\$ 62.7 million as against its positive value of US\$ 181.1 million in the similar period of 2007.

The deficit of the **Capital Account** developed for nine months of 2008 in the value of US\$ 38.4 million, being by 35.5 percent less than the index of the similar period of 2007. This change resulted from the reduction of the net outflow under the item “Migrants’ Transfers” due to the migration outflow.

Based on the figures of nine months of 2008, the balance on the **Financial Account** developed as negative of US\$ 24.3 million, as against its positive value of US\$ 240.6 million in the similar period of 2007. This tendency was mainly due to the excess of the net outflow in other investments over the net inflow of direct investments.

Growth was noted in the reporting period in the net inflow of **direct investments** by 1.4 percent as compared with the comparable indicator of 2007. In this regard, the positive balance totaled US\$ 193.3 million. As compared with the similar period of 2007,

the net inflow in reinvested profit in the reporting period increased by 73.8 percent and in equity capital - by 32.5 percent. In addition, the net inflow in “Other Capital” decreased by 19.3 percent.

Given the classification by economic activities and as compared with the similar period of 2007, growth was noted in the reporting period in the net inflow of foreign direct investments in manufacturing – by 57.7 percent, in financing – by 42.1 percent and in construction – 2.7 times. The reduction was noted in the net inflow in the sphere of transactions with immovable property.

Alongside with this and as compared with the similar period of 2007, the net outflow of direct investments was noted in mining – US\$ 1.5 million, in transport and communication - US\$ 3.0 million, and in the sphere of hotels and restaurants - US\$ 0.7 million.

The geographic structure of foreign direct investments exhibited in the reporting period the fact that the shares of non-CIS and CIS countries were 53.3 and 46.7 percent, accordingly. This ratio was at the level of 45.8 and 54.2 percent, correspondingly, in the similar period of 2007. The volume of direct investments from non-CIS countries was US\$ 103.0 million and increased by 17.9 percent as compared with the comparable indicator of 2007. The largest share of the net inflow of investments falls on such countries, as Great Britain (23.5 percent of the total volume of investments from non-CIS countries), Cyprus (18.0 percent), Korea (17.1 percent), and Australia (11.0 percent). The volume of the net inflow of direct investments from CIS countries decreased by 12.4 percent and totaled US\$ 90.4 million. This reduction was mainly conditioned by the decrease in the net inflow of direct investments from Kazakhstan by 22.1 percent, whose share, based on the figures of nine months of 2008, was about 82.4 percent of the overall total of the net inflow of investments from CIS countries. Alongside with this, the 2.1 times increase was registered in the net inflow of direct investments from Russia, whose share was 17.3 percent.

The reduction of the net outflow of **portfolio investments** was noted to be 51.2 percent in the reporting period as compared with the similar period

of 2007, having thus resulted in weakening of Kyrgyz commercial banks in the area of transactions with foreign securities.

The balance in the item “Other Investment” was observed to worsen and total US\$ 210.7 million as against its positive value of US\$ 64.1 million for nine months of 2007. This item was formed on significant impact of the reduction of the inflow of capital on foreign liabilities of residents of the Kyrgyz Republic for nine months of 2008, with the outflow of capital on foreign assets being significant.

The net outflow of capital on foreign assets of residents totaled US\$ 279.9 million in the reporting period and increased 11.3 times as compared with the similar period of 2007. The significant change was conditioned by the net outflow of capital - US\$ 61.6 million - on foreign assets of commercial banks and the net outflow of capital - US\$ 218.3 million - on “Other Assets”. The net outflow on “Other Assets” was due to 5.9 times growth of payments on accounts receivable as compared with the comparable indicator of 2007, with the volume being US\$ 222.1 million. The classification by types of economic activity showed in the reporting period the significant inflow of accounts receivable - US\$ 159.5 million - in the sphere of financing and US\$ 30.0 million – in manufacturing.

The net inflow of capital on foreign liabilities made US\$ 69.2 million for nine months of 2008, having thus decreased by 22.2 percent as compared with the

comparable indicator in 2007.

The net outflow of capital on foreign liabilities of commercial banks made US\$ 41.1 million, while the net inflow of capital on trade credits (accounts payable) totaled US\$ 62.9 million in the period under review as against the outflow of US\$ 28.5 million in the similar period of 2007. In terms of the classification by types of economic activity, the inflow was registered in accounts payable in the reporting period: US\$ 47.0 million in the sphere of transport and communications in terms of volume, US\$ 20.0 million in the sphere of trade. Alongside with this, the outflow of debt in the sphere of transactions with immovable property was US\$ 17.9 million.

The inflow of credits from nonresidents was noted in the reporting period. Their net inflow amounted to US\$ 47.4 million, of which US\$ 32.9 million was received by the private sector.

For nine months of 2008 the item “**Errors and Omissions**” developed as positive of US\$ 656.1 million and increased 4.6 times as compared with the comparable period of 2007.

Thus, based on the figures of nine months of 2008, the balance of payments was positive of US\$ 103.8 million. In this regard, the volume of gross international reserves totaled US\$ 1282.7 million at the end of the period under review. Coverage of import of goods and services by gold and foreign exchange reserves was 3.7 months.

Chart I.1. Nominal and the Real Effective Exchange Rate Indices

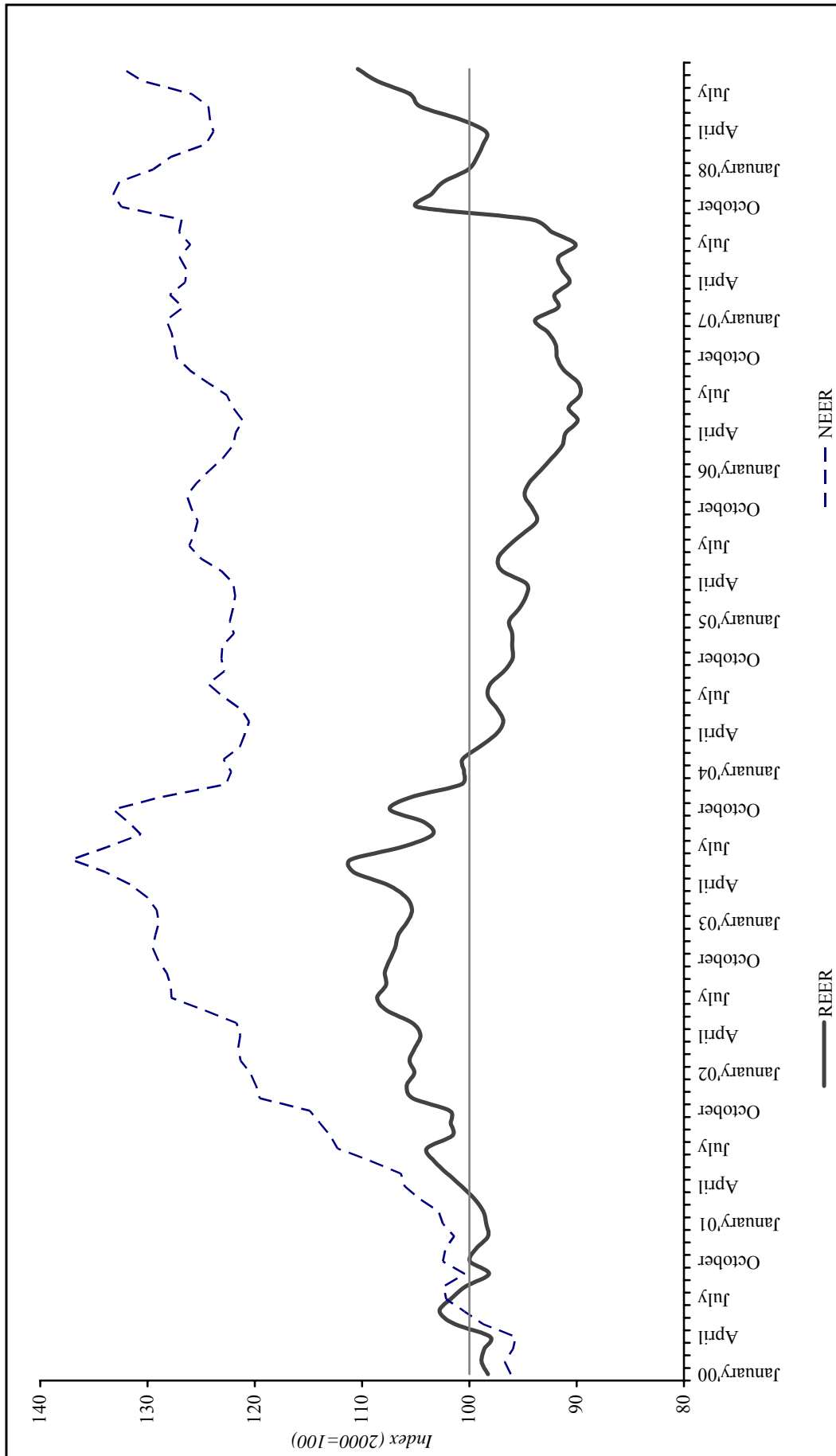
