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Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic

The Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic is prepared by the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic. The periodical describes recent developments in the external sector and contains statistical data on the balance of payments, external trade, international reserves, external debt and an international investment position, as well as a technique and a database to compile the balance of payments. It is published four times a year - in January, May, July, and October. It is published in three languages: Kyrgyz, Russian, and English.

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
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1. CURRENT BALANCE OF PAYMENTS STATUS

Current Account

Both exports (by 16.4 percent), and imports of goods (by 50.5 percent) were noted to have grown in the period under review and resulted in **a deficit of the current account** in the balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic that was equal to US\$ 324.1 million. With regard to GDP, this value was equivalent to 14.6 percent. Growth of the current account deficit was due to growth of the negative balance of services.


Chart 1: Current account

Trade Balance

Having increased at the same time by 37.1 percent as compared to the similar period of 2005, the foreign trade turnover of the Kyrgyz Republic for 9 months of 2006 amounted to US\$1740.3 million,. Growth of the volume of flows of commodities was due to growth of the volume of both import, and export of goods.

Import surplus caused the negative trade balance of US\$583.9 million against US\$275.6 million in the similar period of 2005.

Export of goods at f.o.b. prices for 9 months of 2006 amounted to US\$578.2 million, having thus increased by 16.4 percent as compared to the similar period of the previous year.

Growth of the volume of export was due to mainly growth of the volume of deliveries in such items, as machinery and equipment, clothes, vegetables and fruits, petroleum products, and electricity. At the same time, export of gold in terms of value decreased as against the base period by 9.1 percent, while in physical terms – by 34.8 percent, with gold prices having grown by 39.3 percent. Overall, excluding gold and electricity, the volume of exports of other goods increased by 31.8 percent and amounted to US\$391.7 million.

The functional structure of export in the period under review showed growth of the volume of exports of deliveries of investment goods, consumer goods and energy products by 98.2, 40.7 and 38.4 percent, correspondingly. Furthermore, a reduction was noted in the period under review in exports of primary products by 4.8 percent and producer goods by 4.3 percent.

For 9 months of 2006 export deliveries to non-CIS countries increased by 8.1 percent relative to the comparable period of 2005 and amounted to US\$296.2 million. Basic partners in exports of goods from the non-CIS countries were Switzerland (57.4 percent of total exports), China (9.6 percent) and Turkey (4.6 percent).

Export to the CIS countries for 9 months of 2006 increased by 26.8 percent and amounted to US\$271.2 million. Basic directions in the deliveries to the CIS countries were those to Russia and Kazakhstan, whose shares in the total volume of

exports to the CIS countries made 82.1 percent in the aggregate.

Import of goods at f.o.b. prices amounted to US\$1 162.2 million in the period under review, having thus exceeded the similar indicator of 2005 by 50.5 percent.

Growth of imports at f.o.b. resulted from receipts from the CIS and non-CIS countries by 40.4 and 64.0 percent, correspondingly.

According to the functional structure, growth of import receipts was observed with regard to all of the groups of goods. The largest import items for 9 months of 2006 were those of consumer goods and energy resources - their shares amounted to 30.2 and 29.9 percent, correspondingly.


The share of import at c.i.f. prices decreased in the geographic structure of imports from the CIS countries - from 61.4 to 59.3 percent, while the share of import at these prices from the non-CIS countries increased from 38.6 to 40.7 percent. Russia and Kazakhstan were the main partners in imports from the CIS countries. Having grown by 66.2 percent in terms of value as compared to the similar period of the last year, the share of import from Russia remained the largest one among the CIS countries – 63.1 percent. This increase was on account of growth of imports of fuel, as well as machinery and transport equipment. Imports of goods from Kazakhstan increased by 15.9 percent because of, mainly, the increase in the deliveries of consumer goods. Among the non-CIS countries, as before, principal suppliers of goods, were China, USA, Turkey and Germany, whose shares correspondingly amounted to 30.9, 9.6, 6.2 and 6.1 percent of the total volume of import from the non-CIS countries.

Balance of International Services

The **balance of services** for nine months of

2006 developed as negative of US\$33.1 million, with import of services having grown by 45.5 percent, and export - by 45.9 percent as compared to the similar period of the last year.

The transportation services to nonresidents were rendered in the amount of US\$43.4 million and it is by 8.6 percent below the similar indicator of 2005. Export of services in the item "Travels" more than doubled and amounted to US\$ 117.6 million, having thus made 43.6 percent in the total volume of services. The increase in this item was related to improvements in registration at frontier zones, as well as tourism development. The remaining 40.2 percent of export of services fell on the following services: the business services (21.5 percent of total exports), the government services (6.5 percent), and the construction services (5.9 percent).

The transportation services, whose volume increased by 39.8 percent as compared to the similar period of 2005 and amounted to US\$125.1 million, prevailed in the structure of import. Expenses of residents abroad in the item "Travels" grew 1.5 times as against the comparable period of 2005 and amounted to US\$55.5 million. It was conditioned by both more active business and personal travels abroad, and improved registration at the frontier zones.

Balance of Income

9 months of the current year showed the negative **balance of income** of US\$30.7 million, which was 1.9 times less than the similar indicator of 2005 due to growth of the flow of other investment. As distinct from the previous years, the balance of

other investment developed as positive of US\$8.9 million.

An upward tendency was still there in the negative balance of “Compensation of Labor” in the period under review, which amounted to US\$145 million - it is by 12.4 percent larger than the similar indicator of the corresponding period of 2005.

Balance of Current Transfers


Having exceeded the similar indicator of the last year by 40.0 percent, the traditional positive balance in the item “**Current Transfers**” amounted to US\$323.6 million. This growth was due to the increase in the inflow of current transfers of the private sector, and due to, first of all, growth of the net inflow of remittances of employees. At the same time, the volume of official transfers decreased by 40.6 percent. The inflow of official transfers was mainly in the form of grants, both commodity and cash grants.

Capital and Financial Account

The balance of the **capital and financial account** (in the analytic format of the balance of payments presentation) for the period under review developed as positive, having totaled US\$190.2 million as against the negative balance of the similar indicator of 2005 of US\$67.4 million.

The deficit of the **capital account** for the period under review was equivalent to US\$28.7 million, and it is by 2.1 percent more than the similar indicator of the previous year. It should be noted that as in the past periods this change was due to growth

of an outflow in the item “Transfers of Migrants” caused by strengthened migration processes and export of assets by the migrants.

The positive balance of the **financial account** for 9 months of 2006 amounted to US\$218.9 million against the negative balance of US\$39.3 million of the similar indicator of 2005.

According to results of the period under review, the net inflow of **direct investment** amounted to US\$108.5 million, having thus increased 2.3 times as against the corresponding indicator of the previous year. The largest increase in the inflow of capital was noted in the item “Other Capital”, where the net inflow increased 8.1 times as against the similar indicator of 2005.

The net outflow in **portfolio investment** for 9 months of 2006 was noted to have decreased by US\$4.0 million. The change was conditioned by the reduction of foreign assets of residents, which in turn was due to mainly transactions of Kyrgyz commercial banks with foreign securities.

The balance of **other investment** for the period under review developed as positive of US\$114.4 million as against the negative balance of US\$80.6 million in January-September 2005. It was connected with growth of foreign liabilities of residents of the Kyrgyz Republic, with the foreign assets having significantly decreased at the same time.

The net outflow of foreign assets of residents in the period under review amounted to US\$25.0 million relative to the inflow of assets totaling US\$75.6 million in the corresponding period of the previous year. It is mainly related to the outflow in the item “Cash and Deposits”, when the indicator in January to September of 2005 was characterized by the inflow of foreign assets.

The net inflow of capital from the foreign liabilities amounted to US\$89.4 million as against the outflow of foreign liabilities totaling US\$5.0 million for the comparable period of 2005. This item showed the outflow of cash and deposits and significant growth of foreign debt on trade loans.

The item “**Errors and Omissions**” for the period under review developed as positive of

US\$211.2 million, having thus increased by 8.9 percent, and it most likely a sign of under-accounting of transactions, related to the inflow of capital to the republic.

Foreign economic transactions of the Kyrgyz Republic with other countries of the world for nine months of 2006 showed the positive **balance of**

payments that amounted to US\$77.3 million. At the same time, the volume of international reserves increased by US\$87.4 million and amounted to US\$718.9 million at the end of the reporting period and it covers 4.0 months of import of goods and services.


