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### ***Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic***

"Balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic" is issued by the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic. The legislative basis for the balance of payments are the Law of the Kyrgyz Republic as of July 29, 1997 No. 59 "On the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic" and the Resolution of the Government of the Kyrgyz Republic as of November 3, 2000 No. 645 "On measures to improve statistics of the balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic". This document reflects last tendencies in external sector development and shows statistical data on the balance of payments, external trade, international reserves, external debt and international investment position, as well as construction methods of balance of payments and informational database. This document is published 4 times a year - in January, May, July and October and has 3 language versions: Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

**Last day for update of data for the present publication is January 20, 2013.**

- ... means the absence of data;
- means, that indicators/ratios are equal to 0 (zero) or insignificant;
- is set between years or months (e.g., 1994-1996 or January-June) and means, that all years and months are covered by the shown dates.

Deviations in last digits may occur because of rounding numbers when summing up.

In regard with the possible changes in accounting methods or historical data, which are used in the given document, correction of earlier published data is acceptable. Therefore, 10 years period can be accounted as "open period".

"Press-release of the National Bank" describes current events, which take place in National Bank and provides with the major data on the financial market. It is published weekly in Kyrgyz and Russian languages.


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## THE CURRENT STATUS OF THE BALANCE OF PAYMENTS

Following the results of nine months of 2012, the total balance of payments formed positive in the amount of USD 93.4 million.


**Chart 1: Current Account**

and amounted to USD 4,797.1 million in value terms.

**Export of goods** in FOB prices<sup>3</sup> formed in the amount of USD 1,314.1 million, having decreased by 17.8 percent compared to the same indicator of nine months in 2011, when a historical high in a number of comparable data for the last 5 years was achieved.

In the reporting period, an increased negative balance of goods and services has led to an increase in the current account deficit to USD 1,099.5 million (21.0 percent of GDP)<sup>1</sup>. The current account deficit was financed by capital inflows on the capital account and the financial operations in the amount of USD 658.6 million.

### THE TRADE BALANCE<sup>2</sup>

The **trade balance** of the Kyrgyz Republic has traditionally formed with a negative balance, and in the first nine months of 2012 amounted to USD 2,168.9 million, which is by 93.5 percent more than in the comparable period of 2011 and 63.4 percent higher than the previous peak of deficit recorded in January-September 2008.

The main reasons for the deterioration in the trade balance are the following factors:

- a) a decline in the export of gold;
- b) an increase in the import of oil products

The **foreign trade** turnover in FOB prices in the reporting period increased by 11.1 percent compared to the same period in 2011,

The main factor of reduction in export was a decline in supplies of gold (65.0 percent), which occupied 24.2 percent of the total volume of exported goods in the reporting period. The reason for the decrease was the decline in gold production at the “Kumtor” deposit by 71.7 percent<sup>4</sup> due to technical complications (increased movement of ice and waste rock in the southeastern part of the pit). At the same time, the trend of the value of export to decline was slightly flattened owing to the increase in world gold prices by 7.6 percent<sup>5</sup>.

Export excluding gold totaled USD 834.4 million<sup>6</sup>, which is 24.5 percent more than in the first nine months of 2011, but is 4.2 percent below the maximum in a number of comparable data achieved in January-September 2008. In the reporting period, the predominant portion of the increase of the value of export excluding gold was obtained owing to an increase in:

- other inorganic substances by USD 62.5 million, fruit and nuts by USD 14.2 million, jet kerosene (export of aircraft reserves) by USD 12.7 million (due to a growth of the average export price);
- vehicles for transportation of cargo by USD 30.4 million, ores and concentrates of precious metals by USD 24.7 million, cotton by USD 9.2 million (due to a growth of the volume of supplies).

The above articles along with articles of clothing and clothing accessories, vegetables, electric power, and dairy products were the 10 largest products, which accounted for more than 60.0 percent of export, excluding gold. Along with gold, above goods occupied 70.8 percent of total export in the reporting period.

The largest part of the country's export are **manufacturing** products (metallurgical, textile and clothing industry, the production of electrical equipment), agriculture and power generation.

The reduction in **steel production** by 67.9 percent<sup>7</sup> was reflected in the reduction of the export of gold. The peak of supply of gold for the same periods of the last 5 years was in the first nine months of 2011 (USD 762.1 million), against which the fall in supply in terms of value to USD 266.4 million in the reporting period was significant. The physical volume of export of these products decreased 3.1 times, while the average export prices rose by 9.5 percent.

In the reporting period, there was an increase in the supply on the rest of steel products exported, except for metal scrap iron and waste steel.

The tightening of the rules of the import of goods into the territory of the Customs Union determined the decline in production<sup>8</sup> and the export of certain products of **textile and clothing industry**. In particular, the export of knitted or crocheted clothing items for women and girls decreased by 39.5 percent (a decrease at the expense of a physical volume), garments of textile fabrics for men and boys – by 9.5 percent (a decrease at the expense of reduced prices).

In the reporting period, the average export prices for almost all types of garments decreased. Despite all of the above factors, the export of other goods of clothing production, including the largest group (garments of textile fabrics for women and girls), grew. As a result, the growth rate for the “clothing and clothing accessories” remained positive (growth by 6.6 percent), but slowed down compared to the same periods of the last three years (growth by 90.4 percent in 2010 and 15.6 percent in 2011).

Despite the adverse climatic conditions of the first half of the reporting year, for the first nine months of 2012, the real growth in **agricultural production** constituted 2.0 percent<sup>9</sup>. In the reporting period, compared with the nine months of 2011, there was an increase in the supply of the largest part of agricultural products exported, which occurred due to the increase in both the physical volume and the average export price. Thus, the supply of fruits and nuts grew by 54.0 percent (or by USD 14.2 million), cotton – by 98.4 percent (USD 9.2 million), meat and meat products – 2.0 times (USD 2.2 million), milk and dairy products – by 1.7 percent (USD 0.3 million). At the same time, there was a reduction in the export of vegetables by 13.7 percent (USD 8.6 million), mainly due to the reduction of the physical volume.

**In the geographical structure** of export, the growth in the export of other inorganic chemicals influenced the fact that Kazakhstan has become a major trading partner of the Kyrgyz Republic, occupying 32.2 percent of the total export. The decline in the export of gold led to a relative decline in the share of Switzerland from 43.9 to 24.2 percent. Despite the reduction in the value of export of goods to Russia by 19.2 percent, its share remains relatively stable (15.5 percent against 14.8 percent in the same period of last year). In general, in the reporting period, the Kyrgyz Republic has exported products to 74 countries of the world (in 2008, to 64 countries).

The geographical distribution of the exported goods indicates that, except for gold, the CIS countries are the main markets for domestic goods. High geographic concentration is evident on almost all commodities and commodity groups, primarily on gold, other inorganic substances, vehicles for transportation of cargo and dairy products, more than 95.0 percent supply of which is carried out in one country. The dependence of export of the Kyrgyz Republic on the economic and trade policies of individual countries may be the consequence of this.

In January-September 2012, in the **commodity structure** of import, the largest share was occupied by vehicles and transport equipment (25.4 percent), exceeding the same figure in the comparable period of 2011 by 3.7 percentage points. In this group, a significant share is occupied by used cars, the value of the supply of which in the reporting year increased by 78.7 percent (growth at the expense of the physical volume). Some commodities in this group are partly imported for the consequent re-export: cars for transportation of cargo, parts and accessories for motor vehicles, etc.

The share of the second largest group of imported goods, mineral fuels, has declined from 22.1 to 21.9 percent, despite the increase in value by 26.6 percent, mainly due to increase in supply of petroleum products, whose share in this group reaches 87.5 percent.

Relatively stable prices of Urals crude oil in January-September 2012 (growth by 1.5 percent<sup>10</sup>) constrained the growth of the value of import. In the reporting period, there was an increase in the volume of **petroleum products** by 29.2 percent (or USD 163.2 million). This increase was primarily due to an increase in the physical volume of import by 21.4 percent compared to January-September 2011, caused mainly by a possibility of the duty-free import of fuel and lubricants from Russia. At the same time, the actual average contract prices for imported petroleum products rose by 6.4 percent.

In addition to fuel and lubricants, natural gas and coal, the supply of which rose by 21.8 and 5.4 percent, respectively, occupy a significant share in this group.

The share of manufactured goods classified by material has not changed significantly and amounted to 16.6 percent of the total volume of imported goods. More than one quarter of this group is occupied by iron and steel, the volume of import of which in the same periods of the last two years have been growing dynamically: in January-September 2011, the iron and steel imported by 53.6 percent more, for the reporting period – by 58.8 percent. Other important products of this group include rubber tires, textile fabrics, various metal products, etc.

In the reporting period, in the overall structure of imported food products, coffee, tea, cocoa, and their products, grains, sugar and meat products occupy more than half of the value volume. Taken together, the volume of import of abovementioned goods increased by 12.0 percent compared with the base period and reached USD 241.4 million.

The geographical distribution of import for January-September 2012 remained the same. The country's dependence on energy carriers, consumer goods and some raw materials is the reason that the goods imported from Russia, China and Kazakhstan dominate in import. Overall, the import in the reporting period was carried out from 132 countries of the world (from 110 countries in 2008).

Import of basic foodstuffs were carried out mainly from CIS countries. The largest groups of food products, such as unmilled grains and their products, sugar, vegetable oil and other food products, are imported from these countries. The CIS countries also supply petroleum products. Due to the possibility of duty-free import of petroleum products from the Russian Federation and Kazakhstan extending a temporary ban on the export of light petroleum products before the end of 2012<sup>11</sup>, in the reporting period, 96.5 percent of oil products was imported from Russia, and the share of Kazakhstan has reached its minimum for the comparable periods in the last 5 years (1.8 percent).

The share of non-CIS countries is more visible in the structure of imported non-food consumer goods: the aggregate share of China and Turkey for the supply of clothing and footwear exceeds 90.0 percent, more than 60.0 percent of imported cars come from Japan, the U.S. and Germany.




## THE BALANCE OF INTERNATIONAL SERVICES

The increased volume of foreign trade of the Kyrgyz Republic was supported by an increase in turnover of international services, which in the first nine months of 2012 increased by 24.2 percent, reaching USD 1,998.7 million.

The balance of the “travel” article has traditionally formed with a surplus, which for the first nine months of this year fell by 44.3 percent to USD 87.9 million. At the same time, there was a more dynamic growth (by 42.0 percent) on the import of services related to travel than for services provided to foreign nationals during their stay in the territory of the Kyrgyz Republic (by 11.9 percent). In the dynamics of recent years, the biggest decline in the services related to travel was in January-September 2010, however, consequently, the former turnover volumes have been restored and are still growing.

In the dynamics of transportation services for the corresponding periods of last 5 years, the decline that occurred in the first nine months of 2009-2010 was broken in January-September 2011, and continued growth in the reporting period. The negative balance of USD 333.8 million, formed based on the transport services in the period under review of 2012, was a consequence of a significant increase in import of services on this article on the background of a slight increase in export (33.9 and 4.8 percent, respectively). Import growth was mainly due to the increase of volumes of railway and road transport services (by 32.4 and 91.1 percent, respectively), while on the export, the biggest contributors were air transport services, and other transportation services, which grew by 4.1 percent and in 3.9-times, respectively.

The net export of business services, the value of which in the same periods of last years was unstable, for the nine months of the current year was formed with a negative value in the amount of USD 27.1 million (USD 33.2

**The balance of international services** (neutral presentation of the balance of payments) was negative and amounted to USD 243.9 million against its positive value of USD 0.9 million in the comparable period of 2011. Thus, the deficit of the balance of services peaked in a series of similar data for the past five years, which was facilitated by an outpacing growth in import of services (by 39.5 percent) compared with the growth of their export (by 9.0 percent).

In the reporting period, **export of services** reached USD 877.4 million, which corresponds to 66.8 percent of the volume of the export of goods. **Import of services** amounted to 32.2 percent of import of goods and formed in the amount of USD 1,121.3 million.

In the period under review, the largest articles, accounting for slightly less than 90.0 percent of the total turnover of international services, were travel, transportation, and business services.

The main factor was the surge in import of business services (by 88.1 percent), which was more caused by the growth of consulting services 2.2 times. The volume of export of business services increased slightly compared with the base period (by 8.7 percent).

**In the geographical structure** of services, CIS countries occupy a predominant share: 68.4 percent of export and 64.3 percent of import. The main partners in the export of services are Kazakhstan (45.5 percent of total export), Russia (12.2 percent) and the U.S. (7.0 percent). At the same time, it is worth noting a significant increase in the share of Kazakhstan in the export of services as compared to the nine months of 2011, primarily due to services related to travel. Thus, the volume of services provided to citizens of Kazakhstan during their stay in the territory of the Kyrgyz Republic in the period grew by 75.9 percent.

In the structure of the services, the largest share accounted for the Russian Federation (18.5 percent), Kazakhstan (6.2 percent) and China (3.6 percent). Import growth has occurred both at the expense of increasing the volume of services provided by both the CIS and non-CIS countries (an increase by 33.3 and 52.2 percent, respectively).

## INCOME

In the first nine months of 2012, the negative balance of the “income” article amounted to USD 119.7 million, which is by 72.1 percent less than in January-September 2011.

This trend is mainly caused by the reduction of income of foreign direct investors from investing activities in Kyrgyzstan, which is reflected in the decline of reinvested profit of enterprises from USD 258.4 to USD 66.0 million. As a result, net income on direct investment declined from USD 393.7 million in January-September 2011 to USD 75.5 million in the reporting period.

The increase in interest payments on previous loans received from USD 22.4 million in the first nine months of 2011 to USD 30.7 million in the reporting period influenced the increase in the deficit of the “income from other investments” article to USD 25.7 million. At the same time, the income of residents abroad decreased from USD 10.2 to 5.1 million.

In the reporting period, the balance of the “compensation of employees” article formed negative in the amount of USD 23.2 million and as compared to the same period in 2011 increased by 2.3 percent. This trend is caused by increased income of non-residents from work in Kyrgyzstan.

## TRANSFERS

The positive balance of **current transfers** in the first nine months of 2012 reached another peak, constituting USD 1,432.9 million, which is 6.3 percent more than in January-September 2011, and by 60.6 percent higher than the corresponding period in 2009, which accounted for the greatest decline in net inflows of current transfers in the same periods of last 5 years.

The determining role in the current transfers account is still played by **private transfers** (neutral presentation of the balance of payments), net inflows of which amounted to USD 1,432.3 million, which is 10.2 percent more than in the base period.

This increase was traditionally achieved by remittances, which occupy 98.3 percent of the total income of private transfers. Proceeds on this article continue to grow: the total inflow of remittances amounted to USD 1,593.1 million, having increased by 16.8 percent compared to the first nine months of 2011.


The main channel for remittances to the country is till the money transfer system<sup>12</sup> (91.4 percent of gross inflows). For the reporting period, a net inflow on money transfer systems increased by 15.0 percent, exceeding

USD 1,275.5 million<sup>13</sup>. At the same time, the geographical structure of remittances remains unchanged. In January-September 2012, the bulk of remittances was received from Russian Federation (96.2 percent), Kazakhstan (1.8 percent) and the U.S. (1.4 percent). In the structure of remittances sent from the Kyrgyz Republic, the dominant share also accounts for Russia (97.2 percent).

Remittances remain to be the main source of financing of the trade deficit. The balance of remittances still covers net export of consumer goods, which in turn formed with a negative value of USD 955.4 million.


In the reporting period, a net inflow of current transfers to **the public sector** (neutral presentation of the balance of payments) formed positive in the amount of USD 0.7 million, having decreased by 98.6 percent compared to the corresponding figure in 2011 and reaching a low for the comparable periods of last 5 years considered. The main reason for this decrease was the reduction of cash grants by 94.7 percent.

## CAPITAL ACCOUNT AND FINANCIAL ACCOUNT

In the first nine months of this year, the **capital account and financial account** turned out at a surplus of USD 658.6 million, which is 2.7 times more than the same period of 2011 and by 4.8 percent below the previous record high, achieved in the first nine months of 2009. At the same time, there was an increase in capital inflows both in the financial account and the capital account.

The balance of the capital account has formed positive in the amount of USD 12.1 million for the first time since 2003 (compared to a negative value in the amount of USD 35.0 million in the comparable period of 2011). A positive value of the balance was mainly caused by the decrease in net asset outflows of migrants to USD 12.6 million (a decrease by 83.7 percent), which thus reached a low in a number of

comparative data for the corresponding periods of recent years. The decrease of this figure was influenced by a reduction in the number of citizens traveling abroad for permanent residence, marked in the first nine months of 2012<sup>14</sup>, one of the reasons of which may be the denunciation of Russian-Kyrgyz agreement on the facilitation of the citizenship of the Russian Federation by the citizens of the Kyrgyz Republic in March 2012.

The positive balance of the **financial account** in the first nine months of 2012 was formed in the amount of USD 646.5 million, which is 2.4 times more than in the corresponding period a year earlier and by 9.0 percent less than a peak in the number of comparable data, achieved in nine months of 2009.

The net inflow of **direct investment** in the reporting period amounted to USD 310.8 million, while in the comparable period of the previous year their inflow was recorded in the amount of USD 388.7 million (a reduction by 20.0 percent). The main influence on reducing direct investment was made by a reduction in net inflows of reinvested income, which fell by 74.5 percent to USD 66.0 million. The net inflow of funds invested in equity also decreased from USD 23.7 to 19.0 million. At the same time, the net inflow on other direct investment reflecting the change of debt of companies to direct investor rose from USD 106.7 to 225.9 million, primarily due to an increased volume of loans received from foreign co-owners 2.3 times.

In the reporting period, by the type of economic activity, the greatest net inflow of direct investment was observed in manufacturing, operations with real estate and rent<sup>15</sup> and the finance sector. At the same time, the net inflow on investments in companies, the leading real estate operations, grew by 48.4 percent, and in the manufacturing industry and the financial sector, on the contrary, decreased by 27.6 and 24.8 percent, respectively. Capital inflows from Canada, Britain, China and Germany, followed by the CIS countries, Russia and Kazakhstan, dominate in the geographical breakdown of direct investment. On all above-mentioned countries, there was an

increase in the net inflow of investment, except for flows from Canada (a decrease by 50.6 percent) and China (by 32.9 percent).

In January-September 2012, there was a decrease of the negative balance of **portfolio investment** to USD 61.8 million, while in the comparable period in 2011 the same figure was 30.1 percent higher (USD 88.4 million). Mostly, the outflow of funds was caused by the purchase of foreign debt securities by residents.

Net **other investment** attracted to the country for the first nine months of 2012 amounted to USD 399.1 million, while in the corresponding period of the previous year there was a net outflow of other investment in the amount of USD 26.0 million. The positive balance of other investments formed as a result of the substantial reduction in external assets of residents of the Kyrgyz Republic, along with an increase in their liabilities to the outside world.

In January-September 2012, assets of residents decreased by USD 118.6 million, while in the same period of the previous year, there was their build-up in the amount of USD 208.8 million. At the same time, the greatest reduction was observed on assets of residents placed in their accounts in foreign banks (USD 202.5 million). It should be noted that more than 90.0 percent of total cash balances in the accounts of enterprises abroad as of October 1, 2012 is accounted for by the manufacturing sector.

The volume of accounts receivables to residents of the Kyrgyz Republic increased by USD 37.8 million. At the end of the third quarter of 2012, a total of 89.0 percent of gross receivables<sup>16</sup> accounted for enterprises in operations with real estate and rent, trade, and manufacturing.

Liabilities to the outside world on other investments in the reporting period increased by USD 280.5 million. The growth of liabilities occurred under the influence of increased payables of resident enterprises and borrowed loans.

Accounts payable of resident enterprises grew by USD 61.4 million. Such liabilities were formed mainly in enterprises of trade, manufacturing, transport and communications spheres, which together account for 81.3 percent of total debt<sup>17</sup>.

The net inflow of foreign loans increased by USD 213.3 million, including USD 202.5 million in loans received by the public sector and USD 10.8 million by the private sector. Should be noticed that almost all of the loans attracted by the public sector were received as part of the program of public investment from foreign countries (USD 231.6 million). The amount of interest payments previously received loans increased significantly (USD 31.0 million) on private sector loans, while the flow of loans virtually unchanged and amounted to USD 206.7 million (an increase by USD 4.4 million).

The “**errors and omissions**” article was positive in the amount of USD 534.3 million, which indicates incomplete statistical accounting of transactions related to capital inflows into the country. In order to reduce the rate of this article, the NBKR is currently working to improve the statistical coverage of the balance of payments. The NBKR estimated that the value under “errors and omissions” article amounted to USD 343.6 million.

Gross international reserves at the end of September 2012 amounted to USD 1,967.8 million, which covers 3.9 months of future import of goods and services.


