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Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic

"Balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic" is issued by the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic. This document reflects last tendencies in external sector development and shows statistical data on the balance of payments, external trade, international reserves, external debt and international investment position, as well as construction methods of balance of payments and informational database. This document is published 4 times a year - in January, May, July and October and has 3 language versions: Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

The present publication includes additional information about goods export for 2009.

Last day for update of data for the present publication is July 20, 2010.

- ... means the absence of data;
- means, that indicators/ratios are equal to 0 (zero) or insignificant;
- is set between years or months (e.g., 1994-1996 or January-June) and means, that all years and months are covered by the shown dates.

Deviations in last digits may occur because of rounding numbers when summing up.

In regard with the possible changes in accounting methods or historical data, which are used in the given document, correction of earlier published data is acceptable. Therefore, 10 years period can be accounted as "open period".

It is published quarterly in Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

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The given document provides analysis of the banking system status of the Kyrgyz Republic as a financial intermediary, as well as the banking system stability by segment. It is published twice a year in Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

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The purpose of the document, called "Normative Acts of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic" is to publish normative acts of the National Bank in order to provide commercial banks and public with normative acts of the National Bank and official information on the National Bank activity, as well as propaganda of the Kyrgyz Republic law. Presumable publication frequency is once a month in Kyrgyz and Russian languages.

"Press-release of the National Bank" describes current events, which take place in National Bank and provides with the major data on the financial market. It is published weekly in Kyrgyz and Russian languages.

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
CURRENT ACCOUNT

As per results of the first quarter of 2010, current account developed positive in the amount of US\$ 40.0 million.

Deficit of current account positions constituted 0.2 percent to GDP or US\$ 80.4 million.

in percent to GDP




TRADE BALANCE

As per results of the first quarter of 2010, trade balance deficit¹ of the Kyrgyz Republic decreased by 47.4 percent against first quarter of 2009 and constituted US\$ 161.9 million. Decrease in the negative trade balance amount was due to faster acceleration rates of export in comparison with import.

External turnover in FOB prices increased by 25.3 percent and constituted US\$ 1 096.4 million in value terms. As a result of increased volume of foreign trade activity, turnover with non-CIS and CIS countries increased by 46.5 and 5.9 percent correspondingly.

In the reporting period, **export of goods** in FOB prices constituted US\$ 467.2, having increased by 64.8 percent. The main reason for export growth was increased volume of gold supply to non-CIS countries. Cost volume of gold export in the reporting period increased in 3.2 times and constituted US\$ 239.8 million. Exclusively of gold, export constituted US\$ 227.4 million, which was 9.4 percent higher in comparison with the first quarter of 2009.

In the reporting period there was increase in all items of functional distribution of export, except for energy products². The largest export category was accounted for intermediate goods (61.7 percent from the aggregate export), then raw materials (16.7 percent) and consumer goods (14.6 percent).

The share of energy products decreased by 10.3 percentage points and constituted 5.5 percent.

As for intermediate goods, there was increase in 2.8 times. In the reporting period more than 90.0 percent of export in the considered category of goods was provided by gold supplies to the United Arabic Emirates (85.4 percent from the aggregate export of gold) and to Switzerland (14.6 percent). Accumulation of the gold export volume was provided by increase in physical volume of supplies in 2.5 times and price - by 24.8 percent.

Export of raw material increased by 6.7 percent and constituted US\$ 70.0 million. The main share of raw materials supply (88.1 percent) was accounted for non-organic chemical substances, supplies of which increased by 19.6 percent in the reporting period. At the same time, in this functional category there was decrease in volumes of cotton export from US\$ 5.6 million to US\$ 2.1 million (due to reduction of physical volume of export) and tobacco from US\$ 3.5 million to US\$ 3.1 million (due to fall of export prices).

Increase in supplies of clothes and accessories, incandescent lamps, vegetables, milk and dairy products, mineral waters and nonalcoholic beverages as well as increased re-export of telephone devices provided increase in export of consumer goods by 72.5 percent. As a result the total volume of consumer goods export constituted US\$ 61.3 million in the first quarter of 2010.

Export of energy products decreased by 38.2 percent to US\$ 23.0 million (due to decrease in demand for re-exported oil products), in particular, re-export of aviation kerosene decreased from US\$ 32.2 million to US\$ 11.6 million.

Growth of supplies of gold to non-CIS countries increased their share in geographic distribution of the Kyrgyz export to 80.2 percent. Share of the CIS countries constituted 19.8 percent correspondingly. Leading countries - trade partners were the United Arabic Emirates (50.8 percent from the total export), the United States of America (11.3 percent), Russia (9.5 percent), Switzerland (8.4 percent) and Kazakhstan (6.4 percent).

In the first quarter of 2010, there was sharp increase in export to the United Arabic Emirates - from US\$ 2.0 million to US\$ 213.0 million, which was primarily provided by increase in gold export volumes. Moreover, re-export of aviation kerosene and telephone devices to this country also considerably increased. Supplies of non-organic chemical substances to the United States of America increased, which provided growth of export to this country up to \$US 47.4 million. Export of goods to Russia increased by 49.1 percent and constituted US\$ 39.7 million. Export of clothes and accessories increased in 2.1 times, fresh vegetables - in 1.8 times, incandescent

electric lamps - in 5.0 times, tobacco - in 2.2 times.

Supplies of gold to Switzerland decreased, which provided fall-down of export to this country from US\$ 76.0 million to US\$ 35.2 million. Export to Kazakhstan increased by 56.1 percent and constituted US\$ 26.7 million mainly to increase in export of non-organic chemical substances. In the reporting period there was decrease in export of goods to Uzbekistan (from US\$ 33.3 million to US\$ 10.7 million) and France (from US\$ 42.9 million to US\$ 6.9 million), which was provided by decrease in supplies of aviation kerosene (in the first case) and non-organic chemical substances (in the second case).

In the reporting period, **import of goods** in FOB prices constituted US\$ 629.1 million, having increased by 6.4 percent in comparison with the corresponding index of 2009.

In the reporting period, the import structure remained unchanged: as before the largest shares of imported goods were accounted for consumer goods (32.6 percent out of the total import), energy products (29.8 percent) and intermediate goods (19.7 percent)³.

Import of consumer goods increased by 8.8 percent and constituted US\$ 222.2 million. This tendency was provided by increase in supplies of meat and meat products (in 2.5 times), fruits and nuts (by 70.2 percent), sugar (by 74.8 percent) and medications (by 48.7 percent). At that, there was decrease in import of clothes and accessories (by 9.6 percent), vegetable oils (by 11.7 percent), rice (by 54.1 percent) and flour (by 95.0 percent).

In the reporting period, import of energy products increased by 19.5 percent and constituted US\$ 203.5 million. At that 83.0 percent of import in this functional category was accounted for oil products, supplies of which increased in cost volume due to growth of

import prices, whereas physical volume of import had the tendency for decrease. Import of natural gas decreased by 35.4 percent and constituted US\$ 20.6 million at decrease in contractual prices and in natural terms. In the reporting period, import of coal increased in 3.9 times and constituted US\$ 12.9.

In the first quarter of 2010, demand for imported intermediate goods decreased by 5.6 percent and constituted US\$ 134.5 million. There was decrease in supplies of automotive spare parts, articles of crude iron and steel, fabrics, coloring and tanning substance. This decrease was partially compensated by increased import of rubber tires, fertilizers, wood and plastic materials.

In accordance with the geographic structure, the CIS countries prevailed in import transactions with the share of 56.5 percent, whereas the share of non-CIS countries constituted 43.5 percent correspondingly. The largest suppliers of imported goods were Russia (34.9 percent), China (18.2 percent) and Kazakhstan (11.3 percent).

Russian export increased by 11.0 percent and in cost value constituted US\$ 238.3 million. Increase in export was registered for such groups of goods as nonfood raw materials, mineral fuel, chemical substances and similar production as well as industrial goods.

Supplies of goods from China decreased by 0.9 percent and constituted US\$ 123.8 million. Decrease in import was noted for such major products as fabrics (by 29.8 percent), clothes (by 14.2 percent) and devices with electric communication equipment (by 34.7 percent). Positive tendency was registered for supplies of fruits and vegetables, manual and machine tools and transportation equipment.


Import supplies from Kazakhstan increased by 8.6 percent and constituted US\$ 77.3 million. There was increase in supplies of residual oil (in 3.2 times), coal (in 3.8 times), vegetable oil (in 3.2 times) and non-organic chemical substances (by 29.7 percent). In the reporting period there was import of natural gas from Kazakhstan for the total sum of US\$ 2.3 million. Moreover, there was decrease in import supplies of wheat (by 38.0 percent), flour (by 95.3 percent) and diesel fuel (by 70.8 percent).

BALANCE OF INTERNATIONAL SERVICES

In January-March 2010, negative balance of international services amounted to US\$ 14.9 million, having increased in 2.3 times. This index was formed as a result of higher growth rate of services, received by residents (by 10.2 percent) in comparison with the growth rate, provided by non-residents (by 5.9 percent).

As per results of first three months of 2010, turnover of international services increased by 8.1 percent and reached the amount of US\$ 368.5 million.

In the first quarter of 2010, export of services increased from US\$ 179.2 million to US\$ 189.8 million. This was provided by export growth on such items of international services as "transportation services" (by 11.0 percent), "travels/trips" (by 1.5 percent) and "business services" (in 2.2 times).

Export on the item "transportation services" constituted US\$ 32.1 million, which was 16.9 percent from the total volume of services export. This growth was provided by increase in services, provided by railway and air transportation by 9.3 and 16.0 percent correspondingly.

Cost of services export on the item "travels/trips" increased from US\$ 88.9 million to US\$ 90.3 million, which constituted 47.6 percent from the total volume of services export.

Among other international services the highest accumulation rates of services export were for

"business services", which increased from US\$ 15.3 million to US\$ 33.5 million. Share of this item in the aggregate volume of services export constituted 17.7 percent.

Additional growth of export was noted for such items as "computer and information services" (in 2.8 times) and "governmental services" (by 20.5 percent).

Alongside with this, there was decrease in communication services (by 27.9 percent), construction services (by 85.5 percent), insurance services (by 84.2 percent), financial services (by 97.8 percent) and other services (by 1.9 percent), provided by non-residents.

In January-March 2010, import of services increased from US\$ 185.8 million to US\$ 204.7 million. The largest influence on formation of services import was provided by transportation services, which amounted to 43.0 percent from the total volume of services import, services, received by residents during their stay abroad (32.6 percent) and business services (11.2 percent).

As per results of the first quarter of 2010, import of transportation services was formed in the amount of US\$ 88.0 million, remaining almost at the level of the corresponding index of the past year. Increase in import of services, provided by railway and automobile transportation was compensated by increase in import of services, provided by air and other types of transportation.

Import of services, related to trips of residents abroad, increased by 21.0 percent and amounted to US\$ 66.7 million, which was provided by increase in the number of residents, travelling abroad.

In the structure of import of other services, high growth rates were registered for such items as "construction services" (in 2.5 times), "financial services" (in 3.8 times), "computer and information services" (by 40.7 percent), "governmental services" (by 19.4 percent) and "business services" (by 17.8 percent).

As for communication services, insurance services and other services, there was decrease in import by 35.5 percent, 11.1 percent and 30.0 percent

correspondingly. Their aggregate share constituted 4.9 percent in the total volume of import.

INCOME

As per results of the first quarter of 2010, negative balance of income constituted US\$ 130.5 million, which was in 3.4 times more in comparison with the corresponding index of the first quarter of 2009.

Increase in negative balance of this item was mainly provided by growth of income of direct foreign investors, received from investment activity in the Kyrgyz Republic from US\$ 29.7 million (in the first quarter of 2009) to US\$ 111.4 million in the reporting period (increase was in 3.8 times).

Moreover, negative balance of income on other investments increased in 2.0 times and constituted US\$ 12.1 million. This change was provided by increase in other incomes of foreign investors by US\$ 3.4 million as well as by increase in repayment of credit interests by US\$ 2.5 million.

At the same time, incomes of resident on portfolio investments abroad decreased by US\$ 3.2 million and constituted US\$ 0.1 million. In the reporting period there was the tendency for exceed of non-residents income, received from labor activity in the Kyrgyz Republic, over income of residents in foreign countries from US\$ 6.0 million to US\$ 7.1 million.

TRANSFERS

As per results of the first quarter of 2010, balance of current transfers was positive in the amount of US\$ 226.9 million, which was by 30.2 percent higher in comparison with the corresponding index of 2009.

Net inflow of current transfers into the sector of government administration (neutral presentation of balance of payment) increased from US\$ 6.7 million to US\$ 11.9 million. This growth was due to increase in money grants, received by the government/public sector.


Net inflow of current transfers to other sectors (neutral presentation of balance of payment) constituted US\$ 215.1 million, having increased by 28.3 percent. The main share in the total volume of receipts is accounted for the item "money transfers of workers", net inflow

of which increased by 30.9 percent in the reporting year (by US\$ 50.3 million).

In turn, in the gross inflow of money transfers of workers, the largest share is accounted for money transfers through transfer systems⁴ (98.4 percent). In the reporting period, new inflow by money transfer systems increased by 31.4 percent in comparison with the corresponding index of the past year. At that, in general geographic structure of money transfers remains unchanged. As per results of the first quarter of 2010, the main share of money transfers was from the Russian Federation (91.1 percent), USA (5.3 percent) and Kazakhstan (2.6 percent). Outflow of money transfers was mainly registered to the Russian Federation (97.2 percent).

Balance of money transfers still covers net export of consumer goods, which was formed with the deficit in the amount of US\$ 168.6 million.

CAPITAL AND FINANCIAL ACCOUNT


The balance of capital and financial account was formed positive in the amount of US\$ 97.8 million in the first quarter of 2010. In the corresponding period of 2009, this balance constituted US\$ 3.3 million.

Deficit of capital account decreased from US\$ 6.3 million to US\$ 4.3 million in the reporting period. The largest influence on change of this item was caused

by transactions, related to movement of capital of migrants, moving abroad for permanent residence (item "transfers of migrants"). Thus, the assets, brought away by migrants, are estimated at US\$ 15.4 million, whereas the assets, brought in by migrants, constituted only US\$ 1.8 million. Thus, negative net position of the item "transfers of migrants" decreased from US\$ 15.2 million to US\$ 13.7 million within the reporting period.

Positive balance of financial account increased from US\$ 9.6 million to US\$ 101.6 million due to considerable inflow of direct investments.

Outflow of direct investments in the amount of US\$ 8.7 million, which took place in the first quarter of 2009, changed by their inflow in the reporting period in the amount of US\$ 165.1 million.

During first three months of 2010, direct investments of non-residents increased up to US\$ 138.01 million due to growth of re-invested income of foreign investors, which constituted US\$ 110.6 million (increase in 3.8 times) as well as attraction of investments into other capital in the amount of US\$ 24.7 million (against its outflow in the first quarter of 2009 in the amount of US\$ 45.5 million).

Increase in inflow of direct foreign investments was mainly registered for non-CIS countries, including Canada (in the amount of US\$ 82.7 million) and Great Britain (in the amount of US\$ 17.1 million). Among the CIS countries, inflow of investments was noted from Russia in the amount of US\$ 11.0 million.

By types of economic activity, inflow of direct investments in the amount of US\$ 138.0 million was mainly accounted for processing industry (US\$ 94.4 million), immovable property (US\$ 29.1 million) and financial activity (US\$ 10.4 million).

In the reporting period, the volume of transactions on purchase of foreign securities by non-residents (mainly commercial banks) decreased by 26.2 percent and constituted US\$ 7.7 million.

Inflow of other investments constituted US\$ 55.8 million against its outflow the first quarter of 2009 in the amount of US\$ 28.7 million. This item was formed under the influence of external assets growth by US\$ 127.8 million, whereas in the corresponding period of 2009 there was reduction by US\$ 26.3 million. There was also inflow of capital on the item "liabilities", which positive balance increased from US\$ 2.4 million to US\$ 72.1 million.

Increase in external assets of residents up to US\$ 127.8 million was mainly provided by increase in assets of residents' accounts in foreign banks by US\$ 64.4 million (in 3.7 times) and accounts receivable - by US\$ 61.2 million.

External liabilities of the country were formed under the influence of capital inflow into the banking system in the amount of US\$ 42.4 million (US\$ 0.2 million in the first quarter of 2009). There was also increase in the amount of attracted credits by US\$ 34.2 million (in the first quarter of the past year - by US\$ 17.4 million). The main share of credits was accounted for the governmental/public sector in the amount of US\$ 25.5 million and private sector - US\$ 8.8 million.

Accounts payable in the reporting period decreased from US\$ 12.2 million to US\$ 0.3 million.

The item "Errors and Omissions" developed with the positive balance in the volume of US\$ 22.7 million, thereby testifying the fact of under-accounting of transactions, related to inflow of capital into the republic or under-accounting of export of goods and services.

As of the end of the reporting period, gross international reserves constituted US\$ 1 620.6 million, which was by 54.8 percent more in comparison with the first quarter of 2009. Ratio of coverage with gold and foreign exchange reserves for future import of goods and services constituted 4.4 months.

Chart I.1 Real and Nominal Effective Exchange Rate Indices


