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Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic

"Balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic" is issued by the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic. This document reflects last tendencies in external sector development and shows statistical data on the balance of payments, external trade, international reserves, external debts and international investment position, as well as construction methods of balance of payments and informational database. This document is published 4 times a year - in January, May, July and October and has 3 language versions: Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

- means, that indicators/ratios are equal to 0 (zero) or insignificant;
- is set between years or months (e.g., 1994-1996 or January-June) and means, that all years and months are covered by the shown dates.

Deviations in last digits may occur because of rounding numbers when summing up.

In regard with the possible changes in accounting methods or historical data, which are used in the given document, correction of earlier published data is acceptable. Therefore, 10 years period can be accounted as "open period".

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Annual Report of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic

This document is an overall report of the National Bank for the last year. It includes summary on economic development of the republic and monetary policy, as well as the National Bank financial statements, general information and statistical reviews. It is published in 3 languages: Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

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This publication describes dynamics of consumer prices in the republic and regions, analysis of the main inflation factors, informs about the National Bank decisions on monetary policy and provides with inflation preview for the oncoming period. It is published twice a year in Kyrgyz, Russian and English.


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CURRENT STATE OF THE BALANCE OF PAYMENTS

In the reporting period, the deficit of current account transactions constituted 9.0 percent to GDP.

Trade Balance

According to the results of the first quarter of 2008, the external turnover of the Kyrgyz Republic increased by 31.5 percent in comparison with the same period of 2007 and constituted 1056.4 million US dollars. This growth of the foreign trade activity is explained by considerable surplus of import transactions growth rate over export transactions growth rate.

Trade balance deficit in the first quarter of 2008 increased the rate of the same period in 2007 by 2.1 times and constituted 419.8 million US dollars.

Export of goods in FOB prices increased by 6.2 percent in comparison with the first quarter of 2007 and constituted 318.3 million US dollars.

The distinctive feature¹ of the reporting period was reduction of export supply of energy products (by 26.3 percent in comparison with the first quarter of 2007) and raw materials (by 7.7 percent). Reduction of energy products export supply happened due to decrease of the volumes of the oil products re-export and electric energy supply to neighboring countries. Decrease of the supply volume of such goods as tobacco, sheepskin and lambskin, cotton, stone, sand and gravel affected the reduction of raw materials export.

Also in the reporting period there was an export growth on such major items of the functional structure as intermediate goods and consumer goods.

The highest growth was for intermediate goods (30.0 percent in comparison with the first quarter of 2007) including the supply growth of gold from 51.2 million US dollars in the first quarter of 2007 to 73.9 million US dollars in the reporting period.

Increased supplies of diary products, cereal products, fruits, nuts, margarine, combined fats and mineral water as well as jewelry determined the consumer goods export growth, which constituted 29.2 percent.

In the geographic export structure for the first quarter of 2008, shares of non-CIS countries and CIS countries constituted 52.7 percent and 47.3 percent correspondingly.

In the reporting period there was a reduction of export to non-CIS countries by 8.5 percent. This tendency can be explained mainly by the reduction of export volume to Afghanistan (from 65.9 million US dollars in the first quarter of 2007 to 24.8 million dollars in the first quarter of 2008) that happened owing to the reduction of oil products re-export to this country.

¹ Hereinafter, the analysis of goods export is provided without regard to the Kyrgyz Republic National Bank's estimations.

It should also be noted that during reporting period there was a resumption of gold deliveries to UAE, which were suspended from 2006. Thus the export volume to this country increased by 7.3 times in comparison with the same period of 2007. Export supplies to CIS countries in the reporting period increased by 33.1 percent in comparison with the results of the same period of 2007 and constituted 126.8 million US dollars. The major consumers of the Kyrgyz Republic export among CIS countries traditionally were Russia (41.2 percent out of the total export volume to the CIS countries), Kazakhstan (28.7 percent) and Uzbekistan (22.5 percent). The highest growth rate by 3.3 times was observed for Uzbekistan on account of aviation kerosene re-export to this country.

Goods import in FOB prices in the reporting period increased the rate of the first quarter of 2007 by 46.5 percent and constituted 738.1 million US dollars.

In the functional structure of import, there was a growth on all items. Among them, the maximum growth rate was for consumer goods import (in 2.8 times). In this category, there was a considerable import increase of meat and meat foods, dairy products, wheat, sugar, mineral water, cigarettes, medicaments, automobiles, clothes and clothes accessories. Besides the growth of the goods functional distribution category can be explained by the quality improvement of the “shuttle trade” statistics.

Starting from 2008, NSC starts keeping the record of the “shuttle trade” on types of goods and in the sectional view of countries. The second large category of goods was energy products. The import

of energy products increased by 38.8 percent owing to the growth of oil products and natural gas supply value that happened under the influence of the increased world prices for energy carrier.

In the geographic structure of import in CIF prices in the first quarter of 2008, shares of CIS countries and non-CIS countries constituted 56.9 percent and 43.1 percent correspondingly.

Among CIS countries, the most important goods suppliers in Kyrgyzstan were Russia, Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan that made 53.4 percent of the total import volume. The major import trade positions of above-mentioned countries were motor petrol, diesel fuel, aviation kerosene, wheat, wheat flour, cigarettes, coal and natural gas.

Among non-CIS countries, the major partners on import operations were China (33.6 percent out of the total import volume of non-CIS countries), Germany (16.3 percent) and the United States of America (8.8 percent). In the reporting period, the import was dynamically increased from Japan (by 17.3 times) and Germany (by 5.8 times) due to growth of car deliveries. That can be explained by the expansion of statistics coverage owing to improvement of transactions record performed by the “shuttles”.


International Services Balance

International services balance in January-March of 2008 constituted with the positive balance in the amount of 3.6 million US dollars against negative balance of 41.1 million US dollars in the same period of the previous year.

This can be explained by considerable surplus of services export growth rate over the import transactions growth rate.

Total amount of the provided services to non-residents following the results of the first three months of 2008 constituted 180.6 million US dollars, that is 89.4 percent higher than the rate of the same period of 2007. As well as in the first quarter of 2007, in the

reporting period, the dominant part of export accrued to such items as “Travels” (35.9 percent out of the total amount of export), “Transportation services” (26.5 percent) and “Business services” (12.8 percent). The distinctive feature of the first quarter of 2008 was the fact that export on “Other services” item increased by 4.4 times, whereby their share increased by 7.2 percentage items.


During the reporting period, services import volume increased by 29.6 percent in comparison with the standard period and constituted 176.9 million US dollars. Traditionally the largest specific weight was of “Transportation services”, the share of which constituted 51.5 percent out of the total import in the reporting period. “Travels” item constituted (29.6 percent). “Government Services” are the third in the list, though their specific weight decreased by 12.6 percentage items in comparison with the first quarter of 2007.

Transfers

Positive balance of the current transfers for the first quarter of 2008 increased by 41.4 percent in comparison with the same period of 2008 and constituted 211.6 million US dollars. This growth was provided by the increase of money remittances flow of those people who work abroad, which increased by 32.7 percent. In the previous years, the volume of money transfers covered expenses on financing of consumer goods net export, whereas in the reporting period the situation radically changed: the negative

balance of consumer goods exceeded the net flow of money transfers by 7.5 million US dollars.

Positive balance of the official transfers in the amount of 1.8 million US dollars that took place in the first quarter of 2007 was changed by the negative balance in the reporting period owing to the lack of trade grants investments to the government sector. Thus, negative balance of the official transfers in the amount of 0.8 million US dollars in the first quarter of 2008 was predestinated by membership fees payment to international organization.

Incomes

According to the results of the first quarter of 2008, income balance was negative and constituted 51.4 million US dollars that is 68.9 percent higher than the comparable rate of 2007.

The negative balance growth of this item is associated with the incomes increase to the payment of the direct investments. Thus, in comparison with the first quarter of 2007, negative balance of the item “Direct investments incomes” increased by 52.9 percent and constituted 44.1 million US dollars. The item “Other investments income” made a negative balance in the amount of 2.3 million US dollars against positive balance constituting 3.6 million US dollars in the same period of 2007. Negative balance growth of this rate is caused by the increase of the interest amount paid on foreign credits.


As in the first quarter of 2007, the balance of the item “Compensation of Employees” was negative in the amount of 5.3 million US dollars. In comparison with the same period of 2007, this rate increased by 1.9 percent.

Capital and Financial Account

In the reporting period, **capital and financial account** made positive balance in the amount of 45.5 million US dollars that is 31.6 percent less than the corresponding rate of 2007.

The deficit of the capital account in the first quarter of 2008 constituted 9.1 million US dollars, reducing by 69.1 percent in comparison with the corresponding period of 2007. This change took place owing to reduction of the net outflow on the item “Transfers of Migrants”.

Following the results of the first quarter of 2008, the balance of financial account was positive in the amount of 54.6 million US dollars. Decrease of this rate in comparison with the first quarter of 2007 constituted 43.0 percent.

Positive balance of direct investments in the reporting period constituted 74.5 million US dollars, exceeding the rate of 2007 by 34.1 percent. This can be mainly explained by the increase of direct investments flow into the republic. Thus in the reporting period, in comparison with the first quarter of 2007, the net flow

into reinvested income increased by 2.2 times, and into “Other Capital” by 2.0 times.

As a result of operations performed by the Kyrgyz commercial banks with foreign securities, net capital outflow on the portfolio investments during the reporting period constituted 16.1 million US dollars, increasing by 2.6 times in comparison with the first quarter of 2007.

Following the results of the reporting period, the balance of **other investments** was negative in the amount of 3.8 million US dollars against positive value in the amount of 46.3 million US dollars in the first quarter of 2007. Reduction of the capital inflow on external liabilities of the Kyrgyz Republic residents and a considerable growth of the capital outflow on external assets affected the formation of this item in the reporting period.

Net capital outflow on external assets of the residents during the reporting period constituted 9.2 million US dollars against capital inflow in the amount of 20.0 million US dollars in the first quarter of 2007. This change was due to reduction of net capital inflow on external assets of the commercial banks by 74.3 percent. Moreover, net payment on the accounts receivable increased by 6.9 times, whereas there was a net capital outflow on the item “Other assets” in the amount of 7.4 million US dollars against net inflow in the amount of 1.4 million US dollars in the first quarter of 2007.

Net capital inflow on external liabilities constituted 5.3 million US dollars in the first quarter of 2008, reducing by 79.8 percent in comparison with the corresponding rate of 2007. Net capital outflow on external liabilities of the commercial banks constituted 9.5 million US dollars, whereas net capital inflow on accounts payable in the analyzed period constituted 0.4 million US dollars against outflow in the amount of 29.5 million US dollars in the first quarter of 2007. Credits received from non-residents still played the key role in the total volume of the external liabilities.

Net inflow on the external liabilities constituted 14.5 million US dollars, out of them the sum of 8.7 million dollars came to the private sector.

Thus, following the results of the first quarter of 2008, the balance of payments formed as negative in the amount of 84.5 million US dollars.

For the first quarter of 2008, the item “**Errors and**

omissions” had a positive balance in the amount of 125.9 million US dollars, that testifies about insufficient accounting of export operations and of the capital inflow to the republic.

In the analyzed period, Gross international reserves constituted 1140.5 million US dollars that may cover 3.1 months of goods and services import.

Chart I.1. Nominal and Real Effective Exchange Rate Indices


