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Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic

The Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic is prepared by the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic. The periodical describes recent developments in the external sector and contains statistical data on the balance of payments, external trade, international reserves, external debt and an international investment position, as well as a technique and a database to compile the balance of payments. It is published four times a year - in January, May, July, and October. It is published in three languages: Kyrgyz, Russian, and English.

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Annual Report of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic

This publication is a comprehensive report of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic for the previous year. It contains brief information on economic development of the Kyrgyz Republic, monetary policy, financial statements and general information about the National Bank, and statistical appendixes.

It is published in three languages: Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

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This publication provides analysis and assessment of development of the banking system of the Kyrgyz Republic as a financial intermediary, and also evaluation of stability components of the banking system of the Kyrgyz Republic. It is published semi-annually (as of January 1 and July 1) in the Kyrgyz, Russian and English languages.

Inflation Report

This publication contains description of consumer price movements in the Republic and its regions, analysis of major inflation factors, information about the decisions of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic in the monetary policy area, and presents the inflation forecast for the upcoming period.

It is published quarterly in the Kyrgyz, Russian and English languages.

Statutory Acts of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic

The aim of this publication is to officially publish the statutory acts of the National Bank in order to provide the commercial banks and the public with normative documents of the National Bank as well as to promote banking legislation of the Kyrgyz Republic.

The periodicity of this publication is assumed to be once a month in the Kyrgyz and Russian languages.

Press Release of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic

The Press Release of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic contains a chronicle of events that take place in the National Bank and in the banking system as a whole, operational information and analytical materials on financial market for a week, other information for mass media and the public.

It is published weekly in the Kyrgyz and Russian languages.



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
1. CURRENT STATE OF THE BALANCE OF PAYMENTS

The external surplus increased twice as compared to 9 months of 2006 and amounted to USD 204.3 million. In the reporting period the current account deficit made 18.2 per cent to GDP or USD 474.5 million, which was 3.8 times higher than that of the same period of 2006.

Trade balance

The foreign trade turnover of the Kyrgyz Republic for nine months of 2007 increased by 60.9 per cent as compared to the same period of 2006 and amounted to USD 2,791.5 million. The volume of commodities flows grew due to the increase of both export and import transactions, and import growth rates considerably exceeded export growth rates.

Deficit of the balance of trade for the nine months of 2007 was almost twice the figure for the same period

of 2006, reaching USD 1,146.0 million. The extent of import revenues coverage by export supplies was 41.8 per cent, while in the same period of 2006 this index was equal to 50.0 per cent.

The export f.o.b. for the nine months of 2007 amounted to USD 822.8 million, having increased by 42.3 per cent as compared to the results of the nine months of 2006. The gold export reached USD 169.4 million, against USD 168.7 million for the nine months of 2006, while its physical volume decreased from 8.7 to 7.9 tonnes. The total import increased due to the growth of the world market price for this precious metal. Exports without regard of the gold increased by 59.6 per cent and amounted to USD 653.4 million.

The functional structure of exports showed a growth in all items during the nine months of 2007. The largest categories included intermediate goods (29.4 per cent of the total goods export volume for the nine months of 2007), consumer goods (28.1 per cent) and energy products (25.9 per cent). The export of intermediate goods increased by 8.9 per cent and amounted to USD 238.2 million. This category mostly comprised such commodity items as gold, construction materials, aluminum products (re-export), loading equipment and parts, and various chemical products. The export of consumer goods reached USD 227.9 million, having increased by 40.2 per cent. Major goods in this category included clothing and accessories, fruit and vegetables, incandescent lamps, dairy products. In the period from January to September 2007 the export supplies of energy products considerably increased (2.5 times as compared to the same period of 2006), having made USD 210.4 million in value terms due to an increase in the re-export of oil products to third countries and to the growth of electrical power export.

The share of exports to non-CIS countries went down by 0.9 percentage points as compared to the similar period of 2006, and reached 51.3 per cent. The largest partners among non-CIS countries, same as before, were Switzerland (40.9 per cent of the total exports to non-CIS countries), Afghanistan (25.2 per cent) and China (12.1 per cent). The major export items to these countries were gold, oil products (re-export), special-purpose vehicles, and aluminum products (re-export).

The share of CIS countries in the total volume of all export deliveries was 48.7 per cent. The largest trading partners in the reporting period were Russia, Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan, which provided 93.1 per cent of export to CIS countries. The structure of export to these countries was presented by the following goods: textile apparel, fruit and vegetables, rolled and polished glass, cement, Portland cement, electric power, jet fuel, dairy products, and electric incandescent lamps.

The import f.o.b. for the nine months of 2007 amounted to USD 1,968.8 million, which by 70.1 per cent exceeded the figure for the similar period of 2006.

The functional structure of import showed a stable growth in all items. The most important items were energy products (30.9 per cent of total imports for the nine months of 2007), consumer goods (27.7 per cent), and investment goods (20.8 per cent). An increase in oil products supplies from Russia and Kazakhstan, as well as the natural gas delivery from Uzbekistan facilitated the growth of import of energy products item by 55.7 per cent. The growth of consumer goods imports in the reporting period was equal to 36.6 per cent. This category demonstrated the maximum growth of supplies on such items as medical supplies, grain, tobacco products, coffee, tea, cocoa and cocoa-products, beer. The import of investment goods increased by 56.2 per cent as

compared to the same period of 2006. The major goods in this category included the following: communications appliances and equipment, special-purpose machinery, equipment and machinery for civil construction, automobiles.

In terms of the geographical structure, the share of import from CIS countries increased from 59.2 to 62.8 per cent for the nine months of 2007. The largest importers were Russia and Kazakhstan; their shares in the total volume of imports from CIS countries made 65.4 and 18.9 per cent, accordingly. The major items other than oil products imported from these countries included timber, rubber tires, beer, agricultural equipment, wheat and tobacco goods.

The share of import from non-CIS countries decreased by 3.6 percentage points in the reporting period and made 37.2 per cent. China and USA remained the major import partners, same as before (38.4 and 10.6 per cent of imports volume from outside CIS countries, respectively). These countries mostly imported such goods as communications appliances and equipment, hand and mechanical tools, textile fabrics, freight vehicles, medications, research and monitoring instruments and devices.

Balance of international services

The balance of services for the nine months of 2007 formed with a deficit in the amount of USD 20.1 million, having decreased by 26.0 per cent. Meanwhile, the export of services increased by 51.9 per cent, and the import increased by 44.9 per cent as compared to the same period of 2006.


The total volume of services provided to non-residents over the nine months of 2007 reached USD 418.3 million, which was 1.5 times higher than the figure for the same period in 2006. Same as in previous periods, a significant part of services export was accounted for by the items Travels, Transportation Services, Business Services, and State Services.

Increase of export in the reporting period was due to the growth in the Travels item. The export of this item increased 1.9 times against the same period of 2006 and amounted to USD 226.1 million, which accounted for 54.1 per cent in the total volume of services rendered. The transportation services to non-residents were provided for the amount of USD 68.5

million, which was 57.7 per cent higher than that in the same period of the last year. The share of transportation services in the total amount of services export was 16.4 per cent. Significant shares were also taken by the business services (13.8 per cent) and the state services (5.5 per cent).

The import of services for the nine months of 2007 made USD 438.4 million, having increased by 1.4 times as compared to the same period of 2006. Transportation services, travels, business and financial services still remain the most important components of services import.

Increase of import in the reporting period was due to the growth in the Transportation Services item, which increased 1.8 times against the nine months of 2006. Over the nine months of 2007 this item amounted to USD 227.7 million, which made 51.9 per cent of the total volume of imported services. Residents' foreign expenditures under the item Travels amounted to USD 63.3 million, having increased by 14.0 per cent as compared to the same period of 2006. Other significant shares belong to the business services (13.9 per cent) and financial services (9.0 per cent).

Income

Over the nine months of 2007, the negative income balance formed in the amount of USD 49.7 million, which was 2.3 times more than the comparable figure for 2006.

The growth of this item's credit balance is related to the increase of residents' expenses in item Direct Investments Income. In the reporting period, the favorable balance of item Direct Investments Income

increased by 72.6 per cent as compared to the nine months of 2006, and amounted to USD 42.6 million. This change was most of all influenced by the growth of interest payments on credits issued by foreign direct investors, and also by the increase of payments on reinvested earnings. The item Other Investments Income formed with an unfavorable balance in the amount of USD 6.8 million, which was by USD 11.2 million less than in the similar period of 2006. A reduction in the negative balance of this item was caused by the increase in expenditures on interest paid for foreign credits.


Over the nine months of 2007, the negative balance of item Compensation of Employees formed in the amount of USD 14.0 million. Compared to the similar period of 2006, this balance went down by 3.4 per cent.

Current transfers

Same as always, the positive balance of the item Current Transfers amounted to USD 740.6 million, having exceeded the same indicator of the last year 1.5 times. The major share in the total volume of current transfers belonged to private transfers; the net inflow of the latter increased by 45.7 per cent as compared to the same period of the last year and amounted to USD 719.1 million. The net inflow of official transfers increased 2.1 times as compared to the same period of the last year and formed in the amount of USD 21.5 million.

Meanwhile, it should be mentioned that the net balance of money transfers considerably exceeded the net


export of consumer goods, which in turn formed with the negative balance of USD 235.6 million.

Capital and financial account

The capital and financial account in the reporting period formed with a surplus in the amount of USD 136.2 million, which was by 33.3 per cent lower than the same index of 2006.

A deficit of **capital account** for the nine months of 2007 formed in the amount of USD 58.5 million, having twice exceeded the index of comparable period in 2006. It should be mentioned that this change, same as in recent years, happened due to the increase of net outflow in the item Migrants' Transfers, which was caused by an intensification of migratory processes and migrants' assets exportation.

In the nine months of 2007, the **financial account balance** amounted to positive USD 194.7 million. This index decreased by 16.4 per cent as compared to the appropriate period of 2006.

A favorable balance of **direct investments** in the reporting period amounted to USD 159.7 million, having increased by 47.2 per cent as compared to the similar index of 2006, which was mainly caused by the inflow of reinvested earnings and credits received from direct investors. The net inflow to the reinvested earnings in the reporting period increased

by 80.6 per cent, and the net inflow to the Other Capital increased by 64.0 per cent as compared to the same period of 2006. At the same time, the net inflow to the equity capital decreased by 56.5 per cent.

Following the transactions performed by Kyrgyz commercial banks with foreign securities, the net capital outflow of **portfolio investments** for the nine months of 2007 amounted to USD 4.2 million, having increased by 4.8 per cent as compared to the same period of 2006. The favorable balance of **other investments** by the end of the reporting period amounted to USD 39.2 million, having decreased by 69.5 per cent as compared to the relevant period of 2006.

The net capital outflow in residents' external assets for the reporting period reached USD 37.1 million against the inflow of USD 17.8 million for the nine months of 2006.

The net inflow of external liabilities over the nine months of 2007 amounted to USD 76.4 million, having decreased by 31.0 per cent against the index of appropriate period of 2006. There was a net inflow on external liabilities of commercial banks, which amounted to USD 76.2 million.

Over the nine months of 2007, the item **Errors and Omissions** formed with a surplus of USD 543.1 million against USD 23.1 million for the comparable period of 2006. A positive balance of this item proves that transactions related to the capital inflow to the Kyrgyz Republic were underestimated as well as the export of goods and services.¹

All in all, in the nine months of 2007, the **balance of payments** formed with a surplus of USD 204.3 million. Meanwhile, the volume of gross international reserves reached USD 1,072.8 million as of the end of the reporting period. This volume of reserves was sufficient for financing 3.1 months for critical goods and services import.

Chart I.1. Exchange Rate and the Real Effective Exchange Rate Index


